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in recent years works such as Jean Rhys's *Wide Sargasso Sea*, J. M. Coetzee's *Foe* and Peter Carey's *Jack Maggs* which write back to classic English texts have attracted considerable attention as offering a paradigm for the relationship between post colonial writing and the canon. Thieme's study provides a broad overview of such writing focusing both on responses to texts that have frequently been associated with the colonial project or the construction of race: *The Tempest*, *Robinson Crusoe*, *Heart of Darkness* and *Othello* and texts where the interaction between culture and imperialism is slightly less overt: *Great Expectations*, *Jane Eyre* and *Wuthering Heights*. The post colonial contexts examined are located within their particular social and cultural backgrounds with emphasis on the different forms their responses to their pre texts take and the extent to which they create their own discursive space using Edward Said's models of filiative relationships and affiliative identifications. The book argues that writing back is seldom adversarial rather that it operates along a continuum between complicity and oppositionality that dismantles hierarchical positioning. It also suggests that post colonial appropriations of canonical pre texts frequently generate re readings of their originals. It concludes by considering the implications of this argument for discussions of identity politics and literary genealogies. Southern Postcolonialisms is an anthology of critical essays on new literary representations from the global south that seeks to re-invent, reorient the ideological, disciplinary, aesthetic and pedagogical thrust of postcolonial studies in accordance with the new and shifting politico economic realities, transactions between the north and the south as well as within the global south in an era of globalization. Since the emergence of postcolonial theory in the 1980s the shape of the world has changed dramatically. Old cold war boundaries have shifted in the wake of the collapse of communism. Globalization on an unprecedented scale has dramatically changed the meaning of time and space. The rise of the US as a new imperial power has profound implications for the world order. In the south new emerging markets have challenged the older division of industrial first world and non industrial third world. In most parts of the world the academy is struggling to keep up with these developments. One result has been a major transnational turn in the humanities and social sciences. Terms like world history, globalization, glocalization and transnationalism now dominate academic agendas worldwide. These changing circumstances raise far reaching questions: what does the new emerging world order mean for

established models of postcolonial theory is postcolonialism as a field of study being overtaken by models of globalization and transnationalism what implications do the new configurations in the south have for postcolonial theory this volume drawn from a major literary conference at delhi university provides a set of perspectives on these questions with a majority of contributions by scholars from the south these research articles have a dual focus they revisit older debates on postcolonial theory while suggesting new perspectives and directions

alternatives within the mainstream british black and asian theatres is the first comprehensive collection of critical essays on the subject edited by dimple godiwala the anthology is in six parts a lengthy introduction is followed by part ii histories and trajectories which contains chapters which survey the work of the black theatre forum and the histories of black and asian theatres in britain part iii histories of theatre companies and arts venues charts brief histories of the major theatre companies talawa tara and tamasha and contains a survey of birmingham s changing arts venues part iv called simply controversies is a document of the sikh diaspora s uproar over behzti and issues of censorship part v the dramatists critically explores the work of several dramatists such as killion m gideon liselle kayla roselia john baptiste trish cooke zindika jackie kay valerie mason john wole soyinka sol b river roy williams kwame kwei armah anu kumar rukhsana ahmad bettina gracias bapsi sidhwa tanika gupta deepak verma gurpreet kaur bhatti and yasmin whittaker khan part v theatre voices consists of autobiographical essays by some of britain s theatremakers this contains contributions by jatinder verma yvonne brewster sol b river valerie mason john bapsi sidhwa a long overdue book which examines in imaginative depth the universe inside an often trivialised area of british theatre alternatives within the mainstream provides serious academic opinion and detailed textual analysis in abundance the book s impressive collection of facts and analyses challenge the culture of myth which too often obscures the relevance of black and asian work there are also many absorbing revelations did you know for instance that ignatius sancho was garrick s friend yvonne brewster

the colorful handmade costumes of beads and feathers swirl frenetically as the mardi gras indians dance through the streets of new orleans in remembrance of a widely disputed cultural heritage iroquois indians visit london in the early part of the eighteenth century and give birth to the feathered people in the british popular imagination what do these seemingly disparate strands of culture share over three hundred years and several thousand miles of ocean artfully interweaving theatrical musical and ritual performance from the eighteenth century to the present in london and new orleans cities of the dead takes a look at a rich continuum of intercultural exchange that reinvents recreates and restores history complemented with fifty five illustrations including spectacular photos of the famed mardi gras indians this fascinating work employs an entirely unique approach to the study of culture rather than focusing on one region cities of the dead explores broad cultural connections over place and time showing through myriad examples how performance can revise the unwritten past

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this volume represents the first major bibliography on black theatre and performance in africa the caribbean latin america europe and canada unlike previous bibliographies on the topic this work gives equal weight to africa and the african diaspora and to biographical critical material and play texts themselves john gray has collected more than 4 000 entries from a broad range of media books dissertations and theses unpublished papers periodical and newspaper articles films and videotapes more than 650 playwrights and theatre groups from 45 countries are featured as are performance genres that range from masquerades and carnival celebrations to the most recent works of noted playwrights such as wole soyinka and derek walcott the work is organized into two categories studies of specific geographic areas and countries and materials on individual playwrights within these categories works cited are further divided according to the type of material such as book journal or dissertation also included are a listing of major bibliographies on african american theatre and two appendices that cite reference works and provide a regional listing of african and african diaspora playwrights and theatre companies a set of four indexes covering artists play titles subjects and authors of cited works conclude the book and provide easy access to its comprehensive listings this unique work will be an important resource for courses in african studies theatre arts and minority and ethnic studies it will also be a useful addition to the reference collections of college university and public libraries

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
