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the latest book in a series that seeks to illuminate francis bacon s art and motivations and open up fresh and stimulating ways of understanding his paintings francis bacon was one of the most important artists of the twentieth century his works continue to puzzle and unnerve viewers raising complex questions about their meaning over recent decades two theoretical approaches to bacon s work have come to hold sway first that bacon is an existential painter depicting an absurd and godless world and second that he is an antirepresentational painter whose primary aim is to expose his work directly to the spectator s nervous system francis bacon draws together some of today s leading philosophers and psychoanalytic critics to go beyond established readings of bacon and open up radically new ways of thinking about his art the essays bring bacon into dialogue with figures such as aristotle georg hegel sigmund freud jacques lacan theodor adorno and martin heidegger and situate his work in the broader contexts of modernism and modernity the result is a timely and thought provoking collection that will be essential reading for anyone interested in bacon modern art and contemporary aesthetics

gilles deleuze was one of the most influential and revolutionary philosophers of the twentieth century francis bacon the logic of sensation is his long awaited work on bacon widely regarded

as one of the most radical painters of the twentieth century the book presents a deep engagement with bacon's work and the nature of art. Deleuze analyzes the distinctive innovations that came to mark bacon's style: the isolation of the figure, the violation/deformations of the flesh, the complex use of color, the method of chance, and the use of the triptych form. Along the way, Deleuze introduces a number of his own famous concepts such as the body without organs and the diagram, and contrasts his own approach to painting with that of both the phenomenological and the art historical traditions. Deleuze links bacon's work to Cézanne's notion of a logic of sensation which reaches its summit in color, and the coloring sensation. Investigating this logic, Deleuze explores bacon's crucial relation to past painters such as Velázquez, Cézanne, and Soutine, as well as bacon's rejection of expressionism and abstract painting. Long awaited in translation, Francis Bacon is destined to become a classic philosophical reflection on the nature of painting.

The most comprehensive collection available of bacon's philosophical and scientific writings, this volume offers bacon's major works in their entirety or in generous selections. Revised from the classic 19th-century editions of Spedding, Ellis, and Heath, selections from bacon's natural histories round out this edition by showing the types of compilations that he believed would most contribute to the third part of his great instauration. In her general introduction, Rosemary Sargent sketches bacon's early life, education, and legal career, and discusses the major components of his philosophical works and traces his influence on subsequent natural philosophy.

This collection of essays on Francis Bacon pays tribute to his legacy and influence. The contributors consider the interdisciplinary scope of his art in relation to architecture, continental philosophy, critical theory, gender studies, and the sociology of the body, and compare Bacon with artists, philosophers, and writers who share similar concerns.

At the crossroads of philosophy, artistic practice, and art history, though Gilles Deleuze and Félix Guattari were not strictly art historians, they reinvigorated ontological and formal approaches to art and simultaneously borrowed art historical concepts for their own philosophical work. They were dedicated modernists inspired by the German school of expressionist art historians such as Riegl, Wölfflin, and Worringer, and the great modernist art critics such as Rosenberg, Steinberg, Greenberg, and Fried. The work of Deleuze and Guattari on mannerism and baroque art has led to new approaches to these artistic periods, and their radical transdisciplinarity has influenced contemporary art like no other philosophy before it. Their work therefore raises important methodological questions on the differences and relations among philosophy, artistic practice, and art history. the writings of gilles deleuze and felix guattari offer the most enduring and controversial
contributions to the theory and practice of art in post war continental thought however these
writings are both so wide ranging and so challenging that much of the synoptic work on deleuze
guattarian aesthetics has taken the form of sympathetic exegesis rather than critical appraisal
this rich and original collection of essays authored by both major deleuzian scholars and

the conversations generated by the chapters in music s immanent future grapple with some of

to musical sound as a powerful form of non verbal communication the authors include musicologists philosophers music theorists ethnomusicologists and composers the chapters in this volume investigate and ask fundamental questions about how we think converse write about compose listen to and analyse music the work is informed by the philosophy primarily of gilles deleuze and felix guattari and secondarily of michel foucault julia kristeva and jean luc nancy the chapters cover a wide range of topics focused on twentieth and twenty first century musics covering popular musics art music acousmatic music and electro acoustic musics and including music analysis music s ontology the noise music dichotomy intertextuality and music listening ethnography and the current state of music studies the authors discuss their philosophical perspectives and methodologies of practice led research including their own creative work as a form of research music s immanent future brings together empirical cultural philosophical and creative approaches that will be of interest to musicologists composers music analysts and music philosophers

francis bacon introduced his contemporaries to a new way of investigating nature he called it natural and experimental history despite its rather traditional name bacon s natural and experimental history was a new discipline it comprised new ideas new practices and new models of collaborative research this new discipline was in many ways a surprisingly successful project it provided early modern naturalists with tools methods and models for both investigating nature and writing about their subject it also offered a set of norms and values for guiding research and yet this new discipline was not a science of nature it was more like an art this book aims to trace the emergence evolution and reception of francis bacon s art of experimental natural history
